My FJR was a 2013 and was offered only in grey. I remember being terribly disappointed when the following 2014 model came out in a very nice blue. The point is, there was no way I was going to have two grey bikes. I could have had Dave O. paint my FJR, but that's an expensive choice to make. I decided to look at the dealership's website to see if they had any other FJ-09s available. The website didn't even show the one grey one that Brian had been looking at, so I thought maybe it had been sold. I decided to call them to be sure. When I called they said

they had two grey ones and.... a red one still in the crate. Red! It only took me a minute to Google the bike and look at the photos of the red model. SOLD! At that point, I put a deposit on it and just had to wait for them to assemble the bike and get it ready for me.

Brian was quite shocked when I told him that I'd bought the bike. I told him the grey one was still there, waiting for him, but as of today he hasn't made the decision to buy it. He did, however, drive me to Port Clinton so that I could pick up mine. It seemed like the right thing to do since it was his fault that I bought it.

Now my Ninja is for sale and I'm preparing to take my new FJ-09 on its first MSTR ride – the 7 Ridges Ride. What a strange, very unexpected series of events, but in the end it was all for the better.

The point is... even if you don't think you're in the market for a new motorcycle, you really are. We all are.

My kids got together and decided they were taking their dear ole Dad to the Indy 500 for their Father's day gift. (Awesome, how great is that the kids can afford to bring their Dad anywhere?) I headed out on my bike towards Indianapolis to join in. That Saturday brought sketchy conditions, warm temperatures and showers everywhere. Fortunately I missed most of the heavy downpours that seemed to surround me on the way down and rode through the scattered showers that were in my path.

Things were looking up, the skies cleared on I-24 west bound towards Fort Wayne, that is until the bike and I got there. A stray shower started up right over the newly paved and striped entrance ramp to I-69 south bound. It is a nice 270° on ramp to the south bound freeway, which normally would be one of my favorite curves to bank over and throttle on towards the merge. My preservation instinct kicked in and as the rain picked up, I set the bike into a more conservative lean angle at a reasonable speed. Just wanted to get there, right?

Two-thirds into the turn, I looked north to see what the traffic situation was and how best to merge into traffic. That's when I realized the bike had had drifted a little wide. I pushed the bars into a correction to tighten the line, just as the front tire hit the little wet white line. Goodbye traction hello tank slapper!

Now things went into automatic mode, no thinking, just reacting. The foot attached to my surgically repaired hip, instantly dropped off the peg, and stabbed the pavement to upright the bike. Dirt tracking on a Concours, geez! As soon as I got free of the white line, I accelerated and the tank slapper instantly calmed down. All the while, the driver in the car on the freeway moved over one lane as they saw I was in a "bit of distress". The real moment would've been watching me slide across the freeway, sparks trailing as I go into the ditch on the other side, but fortunately that didn't happen this day.

Literally one mile down the road from that freeway ramp, the sun broke out and the skies cleared. I spent the remainder of the ride thinking about what could have happened. I thought to myself, how I would explain to my surgeon that I snapped both screws that hold that little ceramic ball on my new hip joint. Should I have asked for those reinforced, crash proof screws? I could envision his face and he was not amused.

This little episode took all of about 2 to 3 seconds. It reminds you why, after 40 years of riding, you still need to continually train yourself on what to do and what not to do. It's what you sign up for when riding motorcycles. That day I was lucky but needless to say, I avoided every white stripe for the remainder of the two hour ride. Happy trails!
