

2019 Fall Color Ride Report

This year the MSTR 2019 Fall Color Ride was held on October 3-6. Twenty-three riders plus Max and Rachel showed up for the event. Overall, the event was a big success, with some good weather and some not quite so good, some old roads, some roads we have never seen before and some great time spent with friends.

Many people trailered down to Marietta to start, but since for me, trailering is only for track days and for when the weather is just not conducive to riding (i.e., potential for snow and ice, though I have had some exceptions), I decided to ride down. There was a bit of rain on the way to Toledo, and it was a bit chilly. I met Roy Winseck and Ken Snodgrass at the Bob Evans in Northwood, and after a typically good breakfast, we began heading south. There were two routes down to choose from; both went down to Coshocton for lunch, then after lunch they offered a long and a short way to get the rest of the way to Marietta. We had a couple of small detours before getting to Fremont, and then the same road closure we had before Republic on the way to the Barn Burn Raid in August. All were easily detoured. Just south of Fremont we rode out from under the clouds and into the sunshine, and within an hour, the temperatures had probably risen about 20°F, and we were getting somewhat warm, dressed for where we began.

After riding down OH-60 south from Killbuck, just before we reached US-36, we saw a

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motorcycle parked in the school parking lot, with two people standing by it, and most of their luggage on the ground nearby - could not be a good sign. We quickly turned around and went back to find that Bob and Jennifer were from Grand Rapids, MI, on a trip to SE Ohio, but that the final drive on their motorcycle was failing. From the BMWMOA Anonymous book, we found the nearest dealer in New Philadelphia. Bob called them, and he was advised to not try to limp it to the shop, so after a call to AAA and assurance that a tow truck was on the way. we left Bob and Jennifer and continued on to Coshocton. Before leaving we left them with a card for the MSTR and told them a little bit about the club (and they came to the west side meeting the following Saturday).



Lunch in Coshocton was at the usual Warehouse Steak and Stein, which filled the empty spot in our bellies quite nicely. After lunch, we continued on to Marietta via the short route, with the obligatory stop at the Big Muskie Bucket. For dinner, we loaded into all of the 4-wheel vehicles available for a

quick ride to DaVinci's across the river in Williamstown for a great Italian dinner, followed by the rider's meeting back at the Microtel.

Friday arrived with mild temperatures, clear skies and clear roads for the ride to Lewisburg. Most of the roads were familiar, until we turned onto Alexander-Helvetia road, a short distance north of Rock Cave. This is a county road, but the asphalt is like new, and was mostly clean as it snaked around the mountains and through the valleys as it took us to Helvetia, WV, where we had lunch at The Hütte restaurant. Helvetia is a rather small community (59 reported as of 2010) of Swiss heritage. The town was formed around 1870 by a group of Swiss and German immigrants looking for a place out in the country. It started with 32 residents in 1871, and by 1874, reported 308 Today the Helvetia Historic residents. District is on the National Register of Historic Places. Most did not venture too far into town, as The Hütte restaurant is right on the corner. They serve tasty authentic Swiss cuisine there. Seating was at tables scattered around inside the various main floor rooms of what appeared to have been a house or possibly a hotel from the 1800s, and the interior decorations lent credibility to that theory, with old tools, photos, and appliances all around, as well as an old organ and a switchboard in one room. Unfortunately, as we all arrived within 15 minutes of each other we rather overwhelmed them. While they no doubt worked as hard as they could, patience was required, for which we were ultimately rewarded with great authentic Swiss food, and a dining experience that did not disappoint.



After lunch, the road was good for a while, before it deteriorated a bit due to heavy trucks servicing a coal plant and a quarry, though it remained very entertaining. We had three choices to Lewisburg after lunch, with a long and two short routes. My group took the long route, which took us back south and west to Webster Springs, then south to Charmco and US-60. In Charmco, we had a wait of about 10 to 15 minutes where they were repaying all three directions from the main intersection of WV-20 and US-60, and then we were stuck in traffic to I-64. The rest of the traffic all opted for I-64, so we were left with an entertaining ride the rest of the way into Lewisburg on US-60.

Saturday was overcast. and the temperatures were in the 50s. With the forecast calling for rain on Sunday, more than half of the riders opted to have a fun ride back up to Marietta on Saturday, then ride around Marietta on Sunday until it About ten people started to rain there. remained in Lewisburg. My group had a great ride, on a loop of about 251 miles. We started by heading west, then south and east to Virginia. Lunch was at a Mexican restaurant in Pearisburg, VA, after which we headed up to Paint Bank for dessert before heading back up to I-64 for the last 15 miles to Lewisburg. We took a brief detour to the Smooth Ambler distillery about five miles north of Lewisburg to get a taste of their spirits, before opting to purchase a bottle before returning to the Quality Inn.

During the morning, in the first hour of the ride, we stopped at the John Henry Memorial outside of Talcott, WV. John Henry is an African American folk hero. He worked as a steel driver swinging a sledgehammer driving a steel drill bit into rock, drilling holes to place explosives to blast the C&O Great Bend Tunnel through the mountain outside of Talcott. A few years earlier, a steampowered drill had been invented, and it was brought in to speed up the work. John Henry did not like the steam drill because it threatened to put many men out of work. Legend has it that he challenged the steam drill to a contest to see who could drill a hole

fastest. With a 10-pound sledge in each hand, swinging as fast as he could, he drilled a hole 14 feet into the rock (although the drill bit was only 9 feet) and beat the steam drill. He died in victory with his hammer still in his hand because his heart gave out from stress (or, after the extreme exertion with no rest, he got sick and died a few days later, take your pick). He is buried somewhere near the east entrance to the tunnel. A park at the entrance to the tunnel, which was retired after 100 years of use when a new tunnel was built, memorializes the man, and in 1996, the USPS issued a stamp with his image. To this day, Talcott celebrates the John Henry Days festival each year.



Sunday came overcast, but not raining as we departed Lewisburg. My group began following the route back to Marietta, and most of the first 100 miles were dry. We did have some light rain and wet roads through

Hawk's Nest State Park on US-60, but that stopped and the roads dried back up coming down the mountain into Gauley Bridge, and stayed dry most of the way to Clay, where it began to rain in earnest. At Clav. we stopped for gas, and decided that we would continue to follow the route, but if the roads were wet as we got to I-79, we would hop on the expressway and high tail it back to Marietta, which turns out is what we did. As my riding buddies loaded their bikes into the trailer for the ride home, I continued for home on the motorcycle. Roads started wet with light rain, then dried up for an enjoyable ride to Coshocton for lunch. They remained dry until I was nearing Glenmont on OH-520, where I ran into the heaviest rain of the ride. but after pushing through that, they dried up again for the rest of the ride to Toledo and home.

It turned out to be four fun-filled days of riding with great friends. Thanks to everyone who shared the weekend with me. To those who were unable to make it this year, put this one on your calendar for next year as one to make sure you go to.











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
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
