In Prince George I stayed at Grama's Inn, but I never met Grama! I arrived in Dawson Creek the next afternoon which is the start of the Alaska Hwy!





#### **Connected!**

When I first began riding motorcycles a half century ago (ouch!), staying connected to fellow motorcyclists was entirely based on hand signals. Like many of you I taught myself the basic hand movements first; left-turn, right-turn and stopping. In short order, I added pointing at the gas tank (stop soon), pointing at the crotch (stop real soon!) and tapping the top of your helmet, palm down (slow down, police around).

There were many, many more hand signals to learn, but fortunately technology slowly began to intercede. First came FRS (Family Radio System) communicators and hand-held GPS devices clipped onto handlebars. Then came Bluetooth communicators, cellphones and multifunction GPS devices. Nowadays, if you so choose, you

can become just as "connected" on your motorcycle as you are inside your car. Well, to be blunt, I've made my choice. I'm going for fully connected!

What is shown in the picture is most of the current state of my fully connected motorcycle. The one piece that's not shown is the helmet-mounted communicator. Honestly, that part really doesn't matter, as long as you select the latest Cardo or Sena Mesh & Bluetooth system to take the signals from the other devices and pipe them into the helmet speakers. In summary, following are the connected devices you can see:

- Android cellphone is Bluetoothed to channel 1 of my Cardo Packtalk Edge
- Zumo XT is Bluetoothed to channel 2 of my Cardo Packtalk Edge
- Android cellphone is Bluetoothed to the Zumo XT
- Uniden R4 radar detector w/built-in GPS is Bluetoothed to my android cellphone
- Highway Radar app is running on the android cellphone. Highway Radar is like Waze on steroids

Based on all of the above connected devices:

- I can connect with up to 14 Cardo communicators using Cardo's proprietary Mesh system. Cardo uses voice-based commands to simplify using their device. I can listen to music from my phone, from Sirius or from a built-in FM radio
- I can enable Bluetooth connections to other manufacturer's communicators
- I can make and receive cellphone calls to and from others on channel 1 of my Cardo
- I get GPS turn-by-turn directions on channel 2 of my Cardo and can follow the route (aka the purple line) shown on the GPS screen
- With the Highway Radar app I immediately see radar alerts on my android cellphone screen – they flash different colors based on proximity. I also get proximity alerts for airborne policing like planes and

- helicopters. The radar frequency signals come from the Uniden R4 radar detector but the radarl proximity and airborne alerts are from the Highway Radar app based on the Uniden's GPS location
- I get audible radar alerts and voice announcements from the Uniden R4 through channel 1 of my Cardo. These have about a ½ second delay so they're not ideal for I/O (Instant On) radar. For I/O radar you could plug an LED warning device (from Marc Parnes) to become more "connected"

Of course, it's entirely up to you as to how connected you want to be. Keep in mind a single speeding ticket, and the commensurate insurance hikes (since they'll apply to all your vehicles) could be several times more than the cost of all these connected devices.

Am I advocating speeding and law breaking? Of course not! But as we all know, a single, first gear romp up to anywhere near redline on a modern motorcycle, if done in the vicinity of a policeman with a radar gun, is all it takes to run afoul of every speed limit law in the country.

Feel free to reach out if you're interested in becoming similarly connected. Most of what's shown is straightforward but enabling and using the Highway Radar app (or the iPhone equivalent) requires joining a radar forum and downloading a plugin.




