I can't say that there weren't points where I had some level of trepidation thinking what the hell am I doing signing up for a 6,000 mile plus trip that will include traveling hours on end over some of the most sinisterly flat and boring parts of the country (I'm talking to you Montana, North and South Dakota) that the 48 contiguous states have to offer. But once I was in, I was in, and there came point where my charade had gone on long enough that I couldn't bring myself to suffer the embarrassment of withdrawing so I stuck with it.

One of the products of that 22-day trip was a daily log that I kept so I could remember all of the stuff we did and places we visited. I've read my daily log multiple times since I've been back and it still brings a smile to my face. I'm hoping that, whether you're reading it for the first time or a second time, it will do the same for you. And now onto our adventure...

Day 0 (2-Jun-24) – I've spent the better part of this weekend trying to figure out how to pack clothing, camping gear, tools, video and camera equipment, and provisions into two panniers, a duffel and a small tank bag for an epic three-week, cross-country motorcycle trip which will take us to Redmond, OR and back. This is where the BMW MOA rally will take place and we will cover over 6,000 miles.

Along the way, my riding chums and I will stop at sites such as Mt. Rushmore, Yellowstone National Park, Glacier Lake and other treasures. The *bus* leaves tomorrow morning at 9:00 AM sharp and the first stop will be in St. Ignace.

As has been the case in the past, my trusty riding companion, affectionately named "James Brown" will ride along ensuring the safety of our wagon train and keeping a watchful eye out for potential hoodlums. If you've ever met James Brown during the course of my travels, you know he is the sh\*t!

The next stop was a local tourist attraction called the <u>Mystery Spot</u> where the building's rooms feature optical illusions intended to disorient the viewer while the forces of gravity affect the human body in strange ways. I've had tequila do the same thing so I wasn't that impressed and we left shortly after arriving!

Our final stop before reaching our destination was <u>Lehto's Pasties</u> – apparently the world's best pasties are produced here – to pick up takeout for dinner later. For those not familiar with pasties (pronounced "pass-tee's" by Yoopers and those in the know), this "delicacy" is unique to Michigan's Upper Peninsula – made of beef, rutabaga, and potatoes encased in a baked puff pastry shell – and as bad as they taste, they should remain so!

Shortly after departing, we arrived at the <u>Brevort Lake Campground</u>. With rain in the forecast, we set up our tents as soon as the bikes were parked. We then settled in and chowed down on our football-sized pasties along with some whitefish dip and crackers that were (thankfully) procured as well. There is no doubt that we'll all sleep well tonight.

Day 2 (4-Jun-24) – Reveille was around 6:00 AM and our four-man crew reluctantly began the task of tearing down and packing up our camping gear. We were on the road in just over an hour and arrived at a little roadside breakfast place called the Beary Patch Restaurant in Engadine. The food was the usual breakfast fare but the portions were sizable and the pancake that came with my platter of eggs and double order of bacon was the size of a Frisbee!

Thereafter we departed for Grand Marais and it should be noted that there are two Grand Marais's – one in MN and the other in MI. Grand Marais, MN is a bougie waterfront town with cute clothes and gift shops as well as quaint restaurants that sit on the north shore of Lake Superior by a beautiful marina with numerous sailboats. On the other hand, Grand Marais, MI is a small Podunk town whose main attraction is the *Pickle Barrel House Museum* which, apparently, is what we were planning to see. Thankfully it was closed as "pickle season" is in the fall – boo-hoo!

This last tourist attraction has inspired me to consider opening Kent's Kumquat Museum in proximity to my birthplace. Naturally, there would be an annual kumquat festival that could take place on April 1st but nothing is firm at this time. Of course, there would be a Kumquat King and Queen though in its first year I would nominate myself king. The queen would be voted in by festival attendees but I reserve the right to abdicate or behead her if I'm not happy with the selection. A far more enjoyable venture was our ride on H-58 running through *Picture Rocks National Lakeshore*. This route meandered through a beautiful pine and hardwood forest along the southern shore of Lake Superior. Sadly, the speed limit of 45 mph nearly put us to sleep as we droned along for what seemed like an eternity but the deliverable at the end of this ride was a visit to *Munising Falls* – one of seven falls along this route – which was absolutely stunning and a sight to behold.

The movie starred James Stewart, Lee Remick, Ben Gazzara, and George C. Scott and was loosely based on real events that took place in the town in 1952. Thankfully, the tavern was closed and so we left only minutes after we arrived mitigating a second murder from taking place.

With our final tourist attraction for the day checked off, we returned to Marquette for dinner at the *Steinhaus Restaurant*. The menu featured German cuisine with a contemporary twist and, as an experienced consumer of good, homemade German dishes, I give this restaurant five out of five stars!

With bellies full, we rode the final leg of our day's 307-mile trip to Escanaba, where we had rooms reserved at the *House of Ludington Hotel & Restaurant*, a relic that was built in 1864, offering rooms and beds that were sized for the Lollipop Kids from the Wizard of Oz. Nonetheless, we are all sufficiently tired that having our feet hang over the end of our beds by 18" won't really matter much.

• A somewhat rare Ducati Paso in mint condition


