### Barn Burn Raid (BBR) Ride Report

BBR 9 was a hit, with 18 MSTRiders arriving at the hotel headquarters in Marietta, Ohio to enjoy the best roads in Ohio and West Virginia. The weather was perfect, with warm mornings (no fog) and dry afternoons (low humidity). We had a lunch-time rain on Friday, but it was bone-dry after we finished lunch. There was also a brief rain shower on Saturday. Unfortunately for them, several potential attendees paid far too much attention to the weather *forecasts* and "bailed", anticipating they might actually have to bail during the event.

I know I'm starting to sound like a scratched record but far too many MSTRiders are attaching far too much significance to a high percentage **Probability of Precipitation (PoP)** and deciding to sit at home on the couch instead of going riding or worse, leaving an event early. POP = Confidence x Coverage. If a weather app/forecaster is confident there's a 90% chance that 90% of the area will get precipitation, then the POP is 90% x 90% = 81%. That's about what the mid-week prediction was for Marietta, but we didn't see a single drop of rain until Friday. In fact, there weren't even significant clouds during the week. In this case, the confidence percentage and coverage percentage were both absolutely wrong.

Second, before TOTM even started two of our upnorth MSTRiders, Ann and John Cirner, hosted a fabulous Burger & Brat Burn at their home. 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


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


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
